




Arcades and Highways by Emily Yacina

Dear Daisy,



This fall, an instagram account called @ucmdiningpavilionfoodreview started gaining traction among UC students. Ran by an anonymous student, this account posts pictures of meals from the pavilion and rates them: including ratings for taste, looks, and emotional experience. These posts are highly comedic by themselves, but when you realize that this account only follows the official @ucmdiningpavilion account (and tags them in every single post), the legendary attitude of this account becomes evident. To go even further, the food review account will go on to the official pavilion account and comment under their posts. Most recently, the account commented "this looks like a preschool art project" under a photograph of a colorful vegan vegetable korma. It's obvious that the Pavilion is trying to make up for these slanderous posts by posting their own photos of the food, heavily filtered and idealized in an attempt to seem appealing. The owner of the @ucmdiningpavilionfoodreview is not going to let them get away with that one.

Our editors reached out to the anonymous jokester to ask them about their experience running the account. "I think I made the account back when school started and I was just mad that the pavilion kept serving the same shit every day and the food wasn't that good for what I had to pay for my meal plan. I've experienced a little bit of hate comments and shit, but I never take anything too seriously and most of the hate gets deleted after I roast the fuck out of them. Only my roommates and a couple close friends know that I run the account, and I post a couple hours after I eat so anonymity hasn't really been an issue."

Although these posts are super funny, allowing students to connect over shared experiences and find humor in the unappetizing photos, they do point to a much greater issue regarding the UC Merced dining services and their recent decline in quality. These students deserve better food! Since UC Merced has resumed in person instruction, dining options on campus have become severely limited. The closure of the Yablokoff Wallace dining center and the Summits Marketplace mean that The Pavilion is the only accessible venue which serves 'fresh' meals for students who live on campus.

The @ucmdiningpavilionfoodreview account brings to light the problem that this lack of variety creates for students. Many of the students who eat at the Pavilion are first and second years, new to campus. The poor quality of the food and the limited options for nourishment shed a negative light on UC Merced as a whole. How are students expected to succeed academically if they do not have access to appropriate meals? Some might say that the humor of this page is extreme or exaggerated, but the popularity of this account among the campus community shows that it is working to create discourse around a serious problem. In the comments under these posts, students talk about how the food makes them sick, or how it has no flavor, or how meals are days old, or the same all week long. One student even created a petition to publicize this issue. If you would like to support, the link is included as a QR code! 

Local Business Highlight: Abracadabra

Abracadabra! A place of wonder, mystery, and magic! Self-described as "Merced's most eclectic shop [that] is more than just a store... it's an experience!" Local shop owner Sarah Macias is a born and raised Merced local. She has built her entire life here in Merced- first working at her family's store, then at Strawberry Alarm Clock at age 20 (another Merced Main street highlight). As a lover of the eclectic 90's grunge scene she grew up with, Sarah was inspired to create a space in which she could be creative and foster a hub of creativity in her hometown.

"I've always worked retail my whole life- I grew up in a family business, it's been in my blood. At one point, I just kind of got tired of making money for everyone else, and I really love getting involved in the community. Also, being your own boss is just something that I will never give back- I either flourish or fail on my own accord, not somebody else's."

The shop serves as a focal point for both locals and college students alike to indulge their creative spirit through the mystifying aura that the shop inspires.



Located on Canal and Main, Abracadabra draws you in with a fantastical, ever-changing front window. Inside, you'll find everything: ritual candles, crystals and tarot cards, home decor, a dedicated horror section (complete with a VHS collection and life-size Jason cutout), and curated vintage clothing. The store also hosts a number of exciting events such as horror movie nights, a womxn's club, local band performances, and tarot readings. At the time of this interview, Abracadabra shares its shop space with another store called Kreepy Kawaii.

"... Patti and I found this spot after looking at a lot of other places. We signed the lease three days before the COVID shutdown. Our friends and family were worried for us, but we were both determined, and we didn't want to live in fear.", Sarah said. Since officially opening in September 2020, Abracadabra has quickly become a Merced favorite. Groups of UC students, high schoolers, and adults alike frequent the store to find their next eclectic item. Many art objects for sale are made by Sarah herself- "If I don't create, I wither", the shop owner told us.

We asked Sarah what her experience has been like witnessing the growth of the UC and its impact on the city of Merced:

"Being from Merced before the UC was here, some locals were really nervous about the change and negativity it could bring to our communities. On the other hand, some people were really gung-ho- But that was a lot of people who were gonna become rich from it. And then you had normal people that were just kind of concerned because it was a huge change. From what I've seen, it's brought culture from all over, it's brought people from all over. They're a large part of my customer base, too. Over the past four or five years, I've become close and clicked with a lot of students from the UC, I get to see them grow through their years and then graduate, and it's awesome. And some of them still come and visit."

If UC Merced students should know anything about Merced, Sarah said "[Merced has] a lot to offer. There's the town itself, and there's so much visually, that's appealing. We're two hours away from the ocean or the mountains, so it's a good little safe hub that you can go and travel around from. Merced itself has offered me so many things. And so I think that if people just kind of invest a little bit, that they can also see what Merced has to offer."

When asked about the future, Sarah said "I feel that I am on a precipice of growth. I have a lot of ideas as far as integrating more of the UC with the community- I have tons of events planned, I've got classes that we're going to be starting here, new vendors that will join the space, there's really just endless possibilities."

UC Merced can invest in its community...

The UC Merced Arts department, often known as Global Art Studies Program or GASP, is a hidden gem of the university. It's not a major that many know about. If you tell peers that you major in GASP, the conversation turns into a long winded explanation/defense: 1. What the hell GASP even is, 2. Defend why you're majoring in art at a research/STEM based university that's only 16 years old, 3. For some reason justify whatever plans you have after graduating, something lets say, an engineering student, surely doesn't have to justify as often.

As a GASP major, I take painting, theory, multimedia, critical photography. The classes offered aren't plentiful, but they are individually challenging courses that have made me a better person. I don't think you can say the same about solving chemistry problems, not in the same way. Early mornings in the art lab, drawing, solving the problem of a body until my mind is numb, washing brushes, orange conte stains, sharpening charcoal with a razor, leaving class and walking down the empty halls. The theory of seeing, of culture, learning about the way that images shape our world and opinions. Worrying all weekend about a photo shoot, tying your friend to a stop sign in a busy intersection at sunset to get the perfect shot. I become a recluse in my secret hideaway- the first floor of SSM, the back of the building. The art gallery with its transparent walls, and ever changing insides.

It must be prefaced that this is a love letter, an opinion, and a student perspective, and I certainly don't speak for all students. But I love this department, this city, the people in it, and that is what drives me. As an art student, I feel endless support from my professors and faculty members. The same cannot be said for the school itself. If a student enrolled in an advanced biology course without taking the prerequisite, there would be outrage. However, this past semester students were allowed to enroll in Video 2 classes without taking Video 1, greatly hindering the education of those within the department and revealing the true opinions of our administration. The university has placed our art classrooms, our gallery, very tellingly. We're shoved to the back of the school, behind the new shiny buildings. The new Arts and Computational Sciences Building? I'm grateful, relieved the school gave us a new space so desperately needed, but we are still on the lower level, the one that's hard to find; two floors are relegated for computational sciences. There is still no oil painting class; there is no space for one. Last year, the art gallery lost its only storage space, and now uses a spare room that faculty was able to secure for us at the last minute. The only two buildings with studio art classes are an entire campus across from each other. These placements do not come across as deliberate or particularly nefarious, but more so exemplifies the running theme of neglect to the arts by our school.

by investing in the arts.



The foundation of great universities and their communities come from the arts, because the arts are the foundations of culture. What is UC Merced's culture? Is our student culture reflected in our marketing, our clean graphics, the sanitized aesthetics of a university establishing its reputation? Where is the messiness? How do we facilitate love for the city we occupy? Where is the *Merced* in UC Merced?

One of the most common complaints about the UC from locals and students alike, is that there is a disconnect between the campus and the city, a lack of student unity and community. A lack of creativity, a lack of discourse on campus. The city of Merced is a city teeming with art and life and wonder- murals, bustling theatre, diverse ethnic groups, local businesses, fairy gardens, quirky artists, community elders, vernal pools and fairy shrimp, odd landmarks, eccentricities you'd only see in a place like this, a place where the valley inspires. Yet still, many students only venture into town when they take the bus to Target for groceries. When asked, numerous classmates of mine have never been downtown, have no idea there's a coffee shop, an oddities store, a record store, don't know about the best pizza shop in the central valley. They wouldn't guess there's multiple working artist collectives in the city, because all they see is the UC, where they only take an art class to fill a gap in their schedule, and the single bus stop downtown.

It's not to say the university has completely abandoned the arts; programs with the city and the campus art gallery are admonishable and it is not my goal to belittle these efforts. I acknowledge the roadblocks preventing more from happening. However, when compared to the university's investments in STEM programs and research, the disparity becomes concerning.

There are numerous studies stating the importance of art in education, and the ways it not only creates social and community bonds, but molds well-rounded individuals who are able to critically interact with the world around them. The importance of that cannot be overstated in a university setting. Science and art go hand in hand; you cannot have one without the other. Both create a framework for seeing and understanding the world around you, and both contribute to society by intersecting. To create a truly successful research university, the arts must be an integral part of the campus, and this aspect of UC Merced needs dire support.

Building a university from the ground up is no easy task, and I won't presume I could have done it any better. It's been easy to see the investments the university has made in its research, investments that are paying off- we have a medical school in our future, and our rankings rise every year. But what will make students love going to school here? A number on a list won't do that.

If UC Merced wants its students to love Merced, and to use their knowledge gained here to contribute back to their communities, the UC must invest in its arts. \bigstar
